22<sup>nd</sup> March a Morris and Rapper sword day at Cecil Sharp House, we learn something about traditions not adopted by ourselves, such as "Grimmington and Badby."

29<sup>th</sup> March Dennis Salt a dancer was married in which we took part.

3<sup>rd</sup> May again at Rochester Castle May Queen ceremonies including the Mummers Play "Walk for St. George".

30<sup>th</sup> May a very enjoyable Barbecue evening on Playgate Common, some of my pals from work came to watch and really

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enjoyed themselves.

7<sup>th</sup> June a fine day and fine at Windsor (Berks) day of dance, I met a few of the Girl Guides who I used to teach Country Dancing. We toured in the evening and attended an exhibition held in Cookham Old Church by Stanley Spencer painter of religious scenes, he also asked us to dance on his lawn.

27<sup>th</sup> June a Suffolk tour arranged by George Lawrence, our co-fool. We camped in his garage and lounge. Toured Needham Market, Stowmarket, Woolpit, Bury St. Edmunds, Havenham, Hadleigh. Feltasboue for the Corporation. Sunday morning attended Holy Communion service in Great Blakenham church, morrised in the pub yard opposite while on this tour we made a special

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journey to KERSLEY, because my great  
grandparents were once Dairy Farmers  
there. I danced the "Bonnets so Blue"  
Bucknell jig. The river Stour was in  
flood and stank, so I am now known  
as Strong Pong Kersley, as Kersley is  
one of my christian names.

10<sup>th</sup> July spent an enjoyable evening at  
Norbiton Church dancing for a collection of  
U. N. A. members and friends.

12<sup>th</sup> July an Open Day at the Royal Ballet  
School in White Lodge Richmond Park.  
Norman Keam and I danced a jig for  
the principal and friends, it was "The Nutting  
Girl" Field Town tradition, she was much  
pleased with our performance.

August some of our dancers who are  
members of the "Woodcraft Chivalry"

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performed the moves on the Isle of Arran,  
and money collected was given to the  
Brodick Castle restoration fund.

5<sup>th</sup> September Colchester ring meeting

8<sup>th</sup> November invited by the district E.T.D.L.  
executive committee, of which I am a  
member this year, to perform at the  
National Gathering Cecil Sharp's House. I  
managed to get hold of a Cow's tail for  
our fool. Kathleen starts to make me a  
fools smock, to wear in my old age. We  
get patterns and information from Dryads  
of London, and start on a Black Surrey  
traditional working smock, with a Dorset  
Woodmans stickery design, because I  
follow the woodwork ~~beads~~.

Boxing two two teams, a little snow  
but two completed.

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Members of the side are now Squire Christopher Penton, Bagman Cyril Smith, assistant bagman Ron Duncombe, John Glaister, an ex "Cwefn" dancer Philip Silverster, Norman Team, Bill Tofts, Peter Dashwood, Dennis Salt, Jim Perry, Christopher Ridley, Jimmy Barclay and brother, Billy Graham, Edward Glaister, Gordon Smith the fiddle player. Eric Foxley from Nottingham University, accordian player. Michael Morton, dancer from New College Oxford, Cyril ? dancer Leeds University.

28 November A. S. M. Newlands College

Squire and all Officers re-elected.

John Glaister to be deputy Squire and Squire Elect. Signed by Christopher Penton.

This year 1958 I start to buy this house  
2 Hungerford Villas, I clear the basement and  
some of our dances come on Wednesday  
evenings for jigs and how to dance practices,  
Gordon Smith plays the fiddle. Each

Thursday evening the Woodcraft Folk Club  
from Tolworth come with enough fellows to  
make a team up, but towards the end of  
the year they fade away, and a master  
from Bushey Road, Raynes Park, Boys Grammar  
school take their place and become a  
very good boys side.

Some fellows manage to poke a hole thro'  
the ceiling with the sticks, or even dent  
it with their heads, these marks are  
signed by the individuals concerned.

In the hot summer dancing took place  
on our lawn, watched by neighbours.

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1959 We dance at a boys school in Twickenham, where John Glaster teaches one evening a week, Forbesue House, and they have some very good teams.

16<sup>th</sup> March A district event was held in the Coronation Hall Kingston, we seem to have excelled ourselves for this show.

7<sup>th</sup> March our own Ale in the British Legion Hall, Claygate. Farnborough, East Surrey and Beaufort London City teams were represented. I was pleased to dance with Ron Smedley of Beaufort's, "I'll go and Enlist for a Sailor," Sherbourne, Tradition

11<sup>th</sup> April Two teams attended Cecil Sharp House for a course on The Headington Tradition. William Kimber was present.

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May Day celebrations at Rochester Castle, go by coach, and include this year Sleights Long Sword dance and a Mummers Play, towed home.

9<sup>th</sup> May Day of dance with the Westminster team, a feast and singing to finish with.

18<sup>th</sup> May Whit Monday tour, we took part in Bromley Fair, Martyrs Green, Brookham, Newlands Corner, Alford, Dunsfold, Chiddingfold and by request again at Alford.

3<sup>rd</sup> May some of the team went to Thaxted Ring Meeting.

13<sup>th</sup> May a Scout Fête at Walton-On-Thames, an important Fête for Kingston Hospital, finished with a tour to Kings Head at Shepperton Middle.

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19<sup>th</sup> June a lovely week end with George Lawrence in Suffolk. Woodbridge, Wickham Market, Aldeburgh, Southwold, Saxmundham. Feasts &舞. Holy Communion once again at Bactonham church with dancing afterwards. While dancing at Waldringfield, Mr. & Mrs Douglas Kennedy and Peter arrived. Peter Kennedy played for a few dances, Douglas accepted our bag. On the way home we stopped and danced at St. Albans Cathedral and "The Fighting Cocks."

24<sup>th</sup> June at my birthplace Asford Middle. outside "The Royal <sup>Hart</sup> Theatre" then in Tudor Hall, including Country dancing.

23<sup>rd</sup> July an organised event by Grace Neale in Bishop's Park Fulham.

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August we attend in strong force the  
Dancing Meeting at Headington Quarry Oxford,  
and are lucky enough to have idenreth Fr. Lovelace  
as one of our musicians on the Towns  
Cyril Smith was defeated for the post of  
Chairman.

October 3<sup>rd</sup> back on my home ground for  
Staines Art Club, we dance inside and  
outside of the Town Hall.

17<sup>th</sup> October attend an Elizabethan evening  
in Camberley Surrey.

25<sup>th</sup> November at the Red House Letherhead  
for an international evening run by  
the Rotary Club.

Boozing Day was wet, but dancing went on  
as usual. Outside the Hare and Hounds  
Squire Christopher Penton danced himself  
out with Fieldtown "Nutting Girl" and  
John Glaisyer danced himself in with  
Fieldtown, "None So Pretty". Sixteen men

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turned out, and dancing visitors were.  
Laurie Mosley, Mike Morton of Oxford  
University, Nick Wardle a sword dancer  
from Malvern. Gordon Ralph who of late  
has been absent.

A. G. M. 20<sup>th</sup> November, John Glaisyer elected  
Squire, Cyril Smith Ron Duncombe again  
Bagman, Christopher deputy Squire.

Leward Glaisyer was our first elected  
full member, he was presented with his  
regalia made by Mrs. C. D. Smith. It was  
resolved to support the Wednesday meetings  
in my basement with ~~emphasis~~ emphasis on  
how to dance.

Minutes were signed by John Glaisyer.

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1960 29<sup>th</sup> February we dance for and with  
boys at Reedham School Croydon.

March 12<sup>th</sup> attended an instructional meeting  
at Cecil Sharp House and the newly  
revived Morris dancing was taught, we  
had seen a demonstration by the  
"Men of Mercia" while at the Coventry  
Ring meeting.

March 18<sup>th</sup> danced with boys again at  
Forbesene House Training school in  
Feddington Middx.

April 2<sup>nd</sup> an invitation by Headington  
Quarry Men to attend a Ceilidh, we toured  
up, danced at the West Wycombe chalk  
caves

April 23<sup>rd</sup> our own Ale at the Foley Hall,  
East Swry and North Downsmen were our  
guests

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May 19 = an enjoyable time with the Westminster men on their day of dance.

28 May attend the District Festival in Walpole Park Ealing, calling in at the Strawberry Fair, St. Mary's Training College, Strawberry Hill, Middlesex.

June 6 = Whit Monday tour, good weather and a successful tour. Beckham, Bookham, Newlands Corner, Shere, Newlands Corner, Wisley, Weybridge, Shepperton.

June 11 = I had a week-end, joined East Surrey and Greensleeves men. Once again we meet Douglas Kennedy and Helen, and again hand over the bag.

June 18 = While the side danced a Lassie Hall, Guildford. I danced Jigs at our District Childrens Festival in Grey Court School Ham Surrey.

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June 26 = we toured Somerset, at Bath we were welcomed by some of the Bathampton men. Saturday we danced at West Harptree, Wells, Burham, Weston-Super-Mare where some Wessex men joined us, Bristol and Bath. Sunday travelling home, Chipping Sodbury, Malmesbury where I danced the blessing dance to a baby, "The Shepherds Hey" Headington, Fairford, Lechlade, our last drink was at Vantage.

as I got into George Lawrence car, there was a lot of shouting and a fellow ran up, saying "I thought it was old Brookie", it was Cyril Palmer an ex 688 R. C. who I served with for 6 years, was not allowed to chat long, but had a good laugh.

July 2 = only five men turned up at a

Probary Club Fête in Letherhead, jigs were danced, we then danced with a full side at Canbury Sæders Kingston-upon-Thames for our District Festival.

July 16<sup>th</sup> joined the East Surrey men in Croydon for their District Festival. I met Cleve Mason, who helped to teach me my first steps of morris in Windsor Street Schools, Chertsey, Surrey in 1929.

September 10<sup>th</sup> East Surrey Men held a singing meeting in Reigate a lovely week-end. On Sunday we were one of eight chosen sides to dance at Lyne House where Lucy Broadwood a folk song collector once lived, her father made piano's and one was used by Chopin. Captain Broadwood was our host. The dancing was watched by the High Sheriff.

October 15 = we support a country dance party at Ronayne Hall, Hampton Wick Middlesex, because the Squire of the Ring, Riba Mathews was M.C. a really grand party.

November 30 = for Bill Taffs we show the movies at Furzedown Fields Training College, Tookting, with country dancing to finish with, all joining in.

October 7 = a.g.m. Newlands College, we approve Ewart Russell of Colchester as our nomination for Ring Bagman.

Christopher Ridley has moved to Cornwall, and Edward Glaisyer has gone to Bangor University. Ray Wilson of the Bathampton men has joined us. all officers re-elected.

John Glaisyer signed minutes.

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1961

January 7 We dance at an outdoor exhibition in Glynpia for the Woodcraft Chivalry.

January 14 Squire and Bagnon attend the representatives meeting at Cecil Sharp House. The business was mainly about good presentation of the Morris in public.

John Glaister our Squire marries his daughter off to Peter Jones the East Surrey Squire. Both sides have representative dancers at the wedding feast on March 25.

April 22 an instructional course at Cecil Sharp House, which was mainly Russell Worley presenting the Cecil Sharp unprinted manuscript notes on Sherbourne dancing, particularly the swing high and swing higher movement with the hands.

april 29<sup>th</sup> a tow arranged by Peter Dashwood and Hugh Gibson, Chobham, Farnham, Tilford, Godalming, good numbers and fine weather.

may 6<sup>th</sup> Rochester May Queen celebrations,

Kathleen with Jane Tops made apple blossom garlands to be used by us to form Queens guard of honour. The Surrey working smock was worn for the very first time by Peter Dashwood. Wet weather cut the celebrations. As I was acting Squiree for the day, I was going to be knighted, Sir Hersey.

22 May we keep an invitation from the Headington Jarry men to join them on their Whit Monday tow round Headington Jarry. We tow up, Bells of Gutzley Windsoor, Cookham,

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Wallingford. Bill Kimber, the 86 years old dancer and musician played for, and also approved Jim Barclays "Basset Pipes" jig, taught to him by myself during the basement classes. We finish at a singing and dancing feast.

June 3 = We revive once again the Dingsdon-Upon-Thames Hoch Tide by dancing in the precincts of the Parish Church, collecting £28 towards rehanging the bells. In 1509 the churchwardens gave our ancestors bells for their pads.

June 11 = Christopher Pantours garden to entertain his mainly foreign guests.

June 19 = after dancing again at Lossley Hall for West Surrey Festival, we visit some of Gordon Smith's friends at

Milkhanger, Thwoley which turned out to be a barbecue with plenty of Scotch dancing, open air swimming, nude and it lasted well past midnight.

July 1<sup>st</sup> an important engagement at the Milk Marketing Board head offices Figg's Hill Green, Thames Ditton. Hugh Gibson fools with Surrey working smock.

July 14<sup>th</sup> Sing meeting at Birmingham, town with the "Green Man" men, Erdington, Lichfield, where we danced "Ring O-Bells," and "Sheriff's Ride," traditional dances of Lichfield, and Tamworth, rain spoiled the Sunday dancing.

29<sup>th</sup> July, Christopher Ridley was married in the "Friends Meeting House" Kingston-upon-Thames to Janet Robson, a local country dancer.

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August 5<sup>th</sup> almost all of the team went  
on a Scottish tour. I was very sorry  
it was not possible for me to go.  
The team were invited to dance for the  
weekly entertainment given in Princes  
Gardens Edinburgh. Hugh did some very  
fine fooling in the Surrey working mock,  
he appeared to fill, and make the dancers  
fill the big arena, I can a novice  
supposed him finely with the  
Hobby Horse (King of the May).

Danced in Glencoe and camped near  
the Cochaig, danced at Ballachulish,  
rain spoilt most of the events, on the  
Friday dispersal day, some went to  
St. Andrews for a course.

November 19<sup>th</sup> we morrissed in Kingston at  
a Y.M.C.A. international gathering.

Boscine Day Town round Claygate  
with two sides, musicians and characters,  
weather was bright but very cold.

December 8<sup>th</sup> a.m. at Towner's road

Claygate home of Ron Duncombe.

John Glaister, C. Weston, N. Keam, P. Sylvester,  
W. Tofts, J. Peery, G. Smith, J. Barclay,  
H. Gibson, R. Wilson, R. Duncombe, J. Brooks,  
Cyril Smith was ill, and Peter Dashwood  
was in Newcastle.

Les Nichols of the "Greensleaves side,"  
was our nomination for King Squire.  
Cyril Smith and Ron Duncombe re-elected,  
with John Glaister as Squire, I was  
elected deputy squire and squire elect,  
proposed by John Glaister.

Mark Berry, Stafford M.M. Peter Jones,  
Richard Warner, Brian Green, were

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all elected full members of the side.

It was unanimously agreed we should purchase rapper swords and really get down to forming a sword team.

Minutes signed by John Glaisyer.

1962

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Practices continue at Newlands College, Christopher Penton and my own house.

January 13<sup>th</sup> Squire and Bagman attend a representatives meeting at Cecil Sharp House. Our nominee, Les Nichols of "Greensleeves," was not elected Squire of the Ring.

Our full support was given to Lionel Bacon who was, of "Winchester Tide".

3rd February we were guests at the Guildford Morris Mens Ale, at Jacob's Well, Burpham. I meet Anges Mason, one of the pre-1939 Curfew side.

Woman team and I dance for him, "I'll go and Enlist for a Sailor," to show that I can still dance it, Anges helped to teach me the dance, he joined in final foot up.

March 3<sup>rd</sup> a Barn Dance at "Maria Grey" College Golsworthy. Interesting for me as

I worked for two and a half years there,  
on an extension to the buildings.

May 1<sup>st</sup> The covet day for us to revive  
the Kings Ton, "Hock Tide," dancing and  
collecting in the precincts of the Church.

May 5<sup>th</sup> We joined a small "Ring Meeting"  
at Chipperfield, organised by the  
"Greensleeves" men. Really enjoyable week  
end, it being a small number. Fun was  
had with the stocks at Beaconsfield.

May 12<sup>th</sup> Christopher Parsons and Jim  
Barclays Surrey tour, weather was cold.

May 26<sup>th</sup> we help in the celebrations of the  
dedication of Coventry Cathedral, dancing  
all day around the Cathedral and lovely  
shopping precinct. A few of us managed  
to get inside and have a look round the  
Cathedral.

June 2<sup>nd</sup> district festival in St. Mary's College, Strawberry Hill Middlesex. I had a good look round a lovely old house, once owned by "Lady Walpole".

June 11<sup>th</sup> Whit Monday tour. I went with Gordon and Marjorie Smith, Kathleen and Wendy to Bampton and saw some very fine dancing by that Traditional side. We met up with our own Towing team, in the evening for a show at Brook in Surrey.

June 16<sup>th</sup> Enjoyed the Thatched week-end, most of us camped in Father Jack's Putterills orchard.

June 22<sup>nd</sup> I was unable to go on the Somerset tour. It was an important one because the side danced for a show at the American museum in Bath, then

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on to Cleverton Manor, which appears to be a wonderful establishment, also at a very opulent girls school at Boscombe, joined by four Bathampton men.

July 7<sup>th</sup> we join the "East Surrey" side on their tour of Betchworth, Bear Green, Newdigate, Abinger and Gchley.

July 21<sup>st</sup> a Thames side tour arranged by Gordon Smith and myself, starting at New Bridge Surrey side, Richmond, Golsworth "London Apprentice pub," Teddington Lock, Hampton Wick, Hampton Court Bridge, Molesey Lock, Weston Green, Thames Ditton, and Fulham Middlesex. Later on in the year, some of us went over, with Gordon Smith to Vembley and saw a very fine ciné film of ourselves dancing outside at the "Greyhound"

Weston Green, one feature of it being, a wonderful slow Galley caper by Norman team dancing "Dearest Dicky", from "Fieldtown".

August 18 Cyril Smith and Peter Dashwood learn quite a lot about the rapper sword while on a course at Carmarthen. We are getting on very well under the instruction of John Glaisdon.

September 1 Show off the Rapper to the public for our first time, during an evening of dance outside the "Black Swan" Marthys Green.

September 15 danced at St Pauls school fete in Addlestone Surrey for a number of our dancers and friends who teach there. Finished the evening at Jordans Smith's house Pope's Crose Strawberry Hill.

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looking at a fine collection of slides of all our activities.

September 16 = one Sunday evening we danced for Bill Toffs, his office sports meeting in Sutton Surrey.

September 22 = Seward Slaisters and Peter Jones Town, at the "Queens Head" Byfleet, the landlord invited us to roll back the carpet and perform.

September 28 = a.f.m.

September 29 = Christopher Dentons and Peter Daishwoods New Forest Town. As I am now Squive at the side on my first outing, I had to fool, at the first stop being the "Sir John Barlycorn" Cadnam, in the evening we returned to be filmed by the B.B.C. but rain spoilt this event.

October 6<sup>th</sup> a day at dance at St. Albans,  
Christopher Penton was once Squire of  
this side. usual dancing in the abbey  
sumpter yard.

October 20<sup>th</sup> only one Bagnan was able  
to watch the moves danced in  
Trafalgar Square London, by the  
Sheffield men, it was a wonderful sight.

Boozing Day Town of Claygate,  
followed on our now traditional lines.  
Good weather, all the pubs visited.

Outside of the "Hare and Hounds"  
about noon, John Glaisyer danced  
himself out as Squire with "Fieldbarn  
Nutting fiddle," I sang him out with  
the three lines from 150<sup>th</sup> Psalm which  
are inscribed on the new bell in  
Teakdale church Essex. The Bell being

collected for by movie men and friends  
I danced myself in with Headington  
"Jockey to the Fair." My first dance  
to lead the side in was "Flowers of  
Edinburgh" Banpton Tradition.

Phil Sylvester a lapsed dancer and  
musician joined us for our last dance,  
"Brighton Camp" from Lyndham.

We danced Repper at each stop and  
two sides turned out.

We have danced well this year  
and the side is as strong as ever.

All of these notes have been copied  
from the Thames Valley Log Book  
kept by Cyril Smith, I now continue  
them myself.
